SCHAKEL UNBOUND!

2004 Absolute Champion



Corky Schakel

SIM Corky Schakel, 2003's Absolute co-champion has climbed to the top of the heap by winning the last remaining game in the 2004 Absolute Tournament. Months before the end of the tournament, it had become clear that Corky's final position would depend on his game with Guido Stueber. In an unusual turn of events, Stueber used up almost all his reflection time and then took a 30-day leave during August. The game then moved slowly until the closeout date of 10 October. At this time the game had to be adjudicated. In a tight endgame position, the call went to Corky, a half point winner over the undefeated Ted Brandhorst.

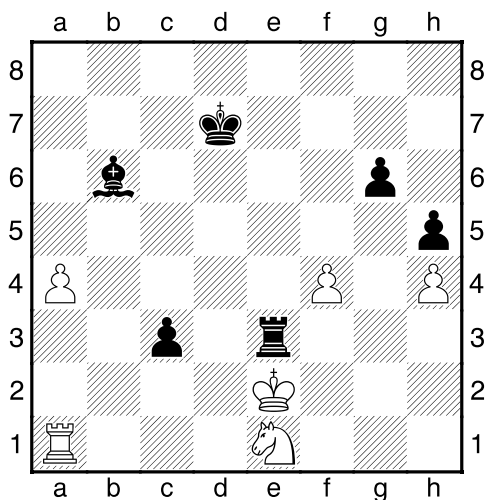

Time ran out here and the position had to be adjudicated. As the a-Pawn is no threat (Advancing it only loses it) and the f and h-Pawns are susceptible to attack by the Bishop and Rook, and the c-Pawn is safe, the position was adjudicated a win. Interested readers are free to comment.
