The 1994 Golden Knights began as usual, with hundreds of hopefuls, some newbies and some veterans. One of the veterans was Robert Ilderton. Robert, born on December 16, 1930, had plenty of experience in Golden Knight play. Once it was even officially announced that he had won the Golden Knights with a near-perfect 17½-½ score, only to discover that at the end of the tournament an 18-0 score rolled in. But that was many years ago. Robert had lots of patience.

At the end of 1999 Robert Ilderton wrote me a letter and sent along a game from his 18-0 finish in the 1994 Golden Knights. This time he knew he would at the very least tie for first. He had finished relatively early (only five years!) and knew that he might have a long wait to see if anyone could tie him. Robert moved from Maryland to Bradenton, Florida.

At long last the 1994 Golden Knights ended this year, 2003. No one tied him. He finished all alone in first place, the reward of patience. But there was no celebrating. Robert Ilderton died on March 6, 2001, the 1994 Golden Knights champion.

Correspondence chess players are a patient bunch.

1994 Golden Knights


Black plays for a favorable French-like formation with White's center already under assault. 8. e5 Nfd7 9. Be3 a5

Now the d3 bishop will disappear.

10. Nbd2 Ba6 11. a4 Bxd3 12. Qxd3 Nc6 13. Rfe1 cxd4 14. Bxd4 Rc8 15. Nb3?!

White's Knight is passive here — White needs to stir up play on the king-side.

15. ... 0-0 16. Nfd2 Nc5 17. Qh3 Qd7 18. Qg4 Nxd4 19. Qxd4 f6



Black opens up the f-file when suddenly White's center and kingside crumble.

20. Re3 fxe5 21. Qxe5 Rf5 22. Qd4 Rcf8 23. Re2 Qe8 24. g3 Qh5 25. Qe3 Rf3!

A little surprise — now White's game fails.

26. Nxf3 Rxf3 27. Qe5 Qxe5 28. Rxe5 Nxb3

With two pieces for the rook, Black has a simple technical win.

29. Rae1 Nc5 30. Kg2 Rd3 31. R5e2 Kf7 32. f3 d4 33. cxd4 Rxd4 34. b3 Rb4 35. Re3 Bf6 36. Rb1 Nxa4 37. Re4 Rxe4 38. fxe4 Nc3 39. Re1 Bd4 40. Rf1+ Ke7 41. Rf4 Bf6 42. h4 b5, White resigns.
